ANNUAL MEETING PLANNED




Another year has fleeted by and it is Annual Meeting time. The wetlands have been acquired and the Eurasian water milfoil treated. The water quality has been tested in five areas each week and all readings have been fine. Because of the small amount of snow

this past winter and no excessive rains, the lake has been quite low, and getting lower fast, but exceptionally clear this year.

The Annual Meeting is when the budget for the coming year is presented and accepted. There are no surprises and no additional expenses. The election of officers is the other item to be presented. The term of office for Commissioners Gil Kroll and Pat Miller are up and both have agreed to run again. The board is required to nominate another person to fill the vacancies and Paul DeMichele's name was presented and he agreed to run. Nominations will be accepted from the floor at the Annual Meeting, but the candidate must agree to have their name presented.

30TH ANNIVERSARY OF CLEAR WATER ACT





 Yard waste pickups in Randall Township are the last two weeks in May and the last two weeks in October. You must purchase a sticker or tag at the



Township Hall in Bassett for \$1.50 and get the biodegradable bags at the grocery store.

- The toxic waste disposable event is Saturday, August 24th from 8AM to 1PM at the Town Hall. A large dumpster is used. A good time to clean the garage.
- Mosquito abatement is not a function of the Lake Management Dist. Of Powers Lake. They have been everywhere around the lake, but have pretty much vanished with the drought.
- The Channel is not stagnant water. It has been tested along with other places in the lake. Suddenly the north side of the bridge is solid duckweed. At first sight it looks like "green gork"or algae. Actually it is a good plant with many benefits. Very prolific, it can double or triple the area it covers in three to five days, and does best out of current and wind. This tiny plant is clover-like with no stem, but a dangling root and is free floating. It has been used in wastewater treatment as it can remove large amount of nutrients from the water, and has no pests. It is a food source for ducks, geese and fish, and provides shade and cover for fish and invertebrates. There are pollywogs and tiny fish and turtles that gobble up mosquito larva and other human undesirables in this area, so it forms it's own mosquito abatement, and extensive coverage inhibits mosquito breeding. In late summer and fall it loses its buoyancy and sinks to the bottom to concluding the annual cycle. I personally checked the water under this extensive green cover and find it to be as fresh and acceptable as any other Powers Lake water.
- Begin thinking about Zebra Muscles and what they
 might do to your boat. They are now in our lake and as
 they multiply and extend their area around out lake, it
 becomes important to have your boat motor tilted out of
 the water. They plug up motors and will cause over
 heating. as they have a barnacle type of life. This has
 begun happening to boats on other lakes in the area with
 zebra muscles.

SWIMMING LESSONS

The Knolls Civic Association is sponsoring swimming lessons for children 3 years old to 11. Classes are eight days in all July 29 to August 1st and August 5th through the 8th. Classes are 9:30 until



noon, held at the Knolls Beach. Each class will last 35 minutes. Two instructors will be present. Call Tina Collins at 279-2922 to enroll. 
I STAND CORRECTED

Did we peek your interest with the picture of the beetle? Our printer failed to include the article that explained its appearance. The picture appeared life-



size. The story goes as written by Gil Kroll: Last fall the Fuller family was in the process of removing their pier for the winter when to their great surprise they discovered lurking in the rocks and sand underwater, a rather large, (over 3 inches long) and scary creature! Having no idea as to the identity of this animal, they captured it and gave Gil Kroll a call. Gil photographed and released it and called Heidi Bunk, DNR. Heidi identified it as a predacious diving beetle, a beetle that spends its time hunting under water even catching small fish for food! This beetle looks dangerous, but is completely harmless and its presence in Powers Lake is an indication of good water quality.
