with the Holidays behind us, we thought you might have an evening by the fireplace to look through the enclosed pamphlet. Time to think about your lake property ... your "Wisconsin-get-away." The environmental agencies of the State of Wisconsin are on the move to have natural lakefronts for all properties. There is a special charm to the natural frontage that softens the appearance of our lakes. Many lakes now have a ruling that you must have a natural frontage extending 35 feet from the shore. The DNR contacted new homebuilders on our lake informing them they could not have

lawn all the way to the shore.
Seawalls, if allowed, are limited and must have apermits. Sand



beaches are not natural to our lake and permits are required for depositing sand along the shoreline. Sand washes into the lake where it can plug up the springs and cover the spawning beds. Another plus to a natural frontage is that geese can't see the lawn so they won't come in to graze and soil your lawn.

MOTHER NATURE IS BOSS

The lake level was very low this past summer. Recent rains have helped but it is still quite low.

SOMETHING FISHY ...

The Annual Fish stocking of the lake took place
the third week in October. It was a joint effort of
the Powers Lake Sportsman's Club, Randall
Township, and the District of Powers Lake
(that's us). 1000 walleyes from nine to
twelve inches were released in Powers

Lake. The DNR usually allows stocking of bass and walleyes in alternate years.

ANNUAL FISHING DERBY

The 48th Annual Ice Fishing Derby is coming on Sunday, February 8th — it is a great family day!

There are no limitations on where to fish, so pick your favorite spot.

Eighty third graders will be involved, and will follow them through the next year as fourth graders as well. They will begin with classroom awareness and later they will go to the lake. BOATING SAFETY COURSES



The Water Patrol will again have at least two sessions of Boat Safety Courses that will be held at Randall Town Hall. The dates have not been selected yet, but we will keep you informed. While they are for all ages, children can get their boating

certificates so they can drive a boat or a personal water craft at 12 years of age. The law says that children cannot drive a boat or personal watercraft until 16 years of age without the certificate earned through the classes.

JOIN THE CLUB

Snowmobilers need to join a trail club in order to use the trails. The Twin Runners are the local group. If your snowmobile is registered in Illinois it needs a Wisconsin registration (\$10). A family membership covering several snowmobiles and family drivers can be purchased at either of the snowmobile dealers: Twin Lakes Marine, or Recreation Plus. Family memberships are \$30. The next District of Powers Lake Meeting will be January 10th at 5pm at Randall Town Hall. Everyone is welcome. See you then.




ANNUAL STATE LAKE CONVENTION
