This summer is sailing right along and with our up and down weather it seems to be going too fast.




Adopt A Lake Program

Water Patrol Chief Lawrence would like to share his biggest problems so far this year. Too many boats are coming within 100 feet of the marked off swimming area at the Knolls Beach. This is dangerous and citations are written for this. He urges that all boaters learn what 100 feet and 200 feet look like on water.

The next issue is that homeowners are letting their guests use their equipment, boats and jet skis.

It is important that you act responsibly about making sure your guests know the rules and regulations. The Water Patrol are having too many guests who

have no concept of what is allowed.

There were teenage boys rescued who dove from a boat in waves and wind and could not get back to the boat. The girls left on the boat had no knowledge of how to run a boat.


Chief Lawrence feels we should all practice throwing the life preserver cushions so they can get to those who need them. An underhand throw is best. The rule when those in the water need help is REACH - THROW - ROW - GO. Do not REACH with an arm as you may be pulled in. Use a paddle or oar, or pole, THROW, a rope, a cushion, a life preserver, or something that floats. ROW as close as you can. If all else fails GO for help.

Water Testing

Commissioner Gil Kroll continues his weekly water testing. Different areas are tested each time except the beach which is always tested. All tests have proven to be fine and no evidence of pollution was found. This is a good time to remind everyone about septic tank care. 1.

Have your septic tank pumped every two or three years. 2. Be careful what

you put down the drain. Harsh chemicals can kill the bacteria you need to make your tank effective. 3. Do not put cigarette butts, diapers, facial tissues and sanitary items or grease in system, because this is not good "food" for the bacteria. 4. Limit water usage. Do not let faucets run. Shorten time for showers. The system is designed for only so many gallons a day. 5. Spread out loads of laundry, only one or two a day. 6. Reduce use of garbage disposal. They are a bad idea with septic systems and can quickly fill up your tank. 7. Clear water systems should not go into the septic system i.e. air conditioners, water softeners and dehumidifiers 8. Do not drive on your septic field, plant trees near, or put extra dirt on them. Do not allow watershed to go across the septic field. Keep your system healthy so as not to pollute groundwater and the lake.

Commissioner Terms Expiring


